### Bernard Hopkins~

- ✓ Growing up in a tough neighborhood, he got into trouble with the law and went to prison, but was able to rise above his mistakes with religion and perseverance.
- ✓ Earned his high school diploma.
- ✓ Fought through injury.
- ✓ Rose from poverty to become a world famous fighter and world champion.
- ✓ Challenged La Hoya, won, and learned to work with him for the success of others.
- ✓ Respects those who have overcome difficult environments to achieve success through hard work.

### Joe Frazier~

- ✓ Rose from poverty to become a world famous fighter and world champion
- ✓ Unwilling to accept defeat in the Bonavena fight: defined him as a rugged and stubborn competitor.
- ✓ Defeated Ali in the first of their three matches
- ✓ The strength of his character, even in defeat, marks Frazier as a man that epitomizes King’s definition of a great American

### Tommy Loughran~

- ✓ Grew up in a poor section of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania
- ✓ Became famous as the “Phantom of Philly”
- ✓ Fought successfully within and outside of his weight class
- ✓ Kept boxing after an injury caused him to alter his style
- ✓ Fought Primo Carnera, despite the huge size difference
- ✓ Religious faith played a role in his character
- ✓ Served his country in World War II
- ✓ Translated success in the ring into success after boxing as a speaker and investor.
