The Patriotic American -Orr in the Chicago <i>Tribune</i>	 Suggested responses may include: American Union Member Immigrant accused of Communist beliefs Reflects the anger of American labor toward immigrant workers Reflects possible American workers concern that immigrants will bring communist ideas to industry Message is that patriotic Americans reject extreme and communist views of foreigners
"Put them out and keep them out" Morgan in <i>Philadelphia Inquirer</i>	Suggested responses may include: Communist with Bolshevik sword and anarchy torch American flag Red trying to sneak into America Caption indicates Americans do not want Reds in their country

Title of Cartoon	Key individuals, places, ideas, intended audience, historical context
Close the Gate - Orr in the Chicago <i>Tribune</i>	Suggested responses may include: Wall with gate to represent the United States Immigrant with bomb as head carrying unwanted ideas into America Immigrants will cause chaos in America The government must impose immigration restrictions to protect the country
Fungus - Harding in the Brooklyn Eagle	Suggested responses may include:

"Too Slow for Me!" - Skyes in the Philadelphia Evening Ledger	 Suggested responses may include: Ladder with rungs labeled industry, thrift, knowledge and skill The ladder is the way to success in America The rungs represent American values that only work with law and order A rocket labeled Bolshevism with an immigrant riding it. The title implies that radicals don't want to follow the typical American path to success. The immigrant approach would be radical and against American tradition
Cartoon – Come Unto Me Ye Oppressed - Alley in Memphis Commercial Appeal	 Suggested responses may include: Statue of Liberty European anarchist with knife and bomb Message is that the European immigrants bring radical ideas and danger to America. They are a threat to American liberty Bias toward immigrants by connecting them to anarchism

Title of Cartoon	Key individuals, places, ideas, intended audience, historical context
Cartoon — "Say—Do I Look Sick?" - Williams in Farm Life (Spencer, Ind.)	 Suggested responses may include: American Farmer (giant size indicates strength and health) Russian/Bolshevik quack doctor "Russian Remedy" medicine or communism Medicine bag which says "cures everything" Message: Russians are like quack doctors trying to sell Americans medicine of communism which they do not need.
The Way It Strikes the Public - Morris for the George Matthew Adams Service	Suggested responses may include: Variety of workers – Railroad, street car, milk drivers, butchers, bakers, cleaning people Man representing the public Workers portrayed as much larger than public, perhaps indicating their strength Man representing public appears timid when directed to crawl through the line of workers Workers armed with equipment that is positioned like weapons Implication may be that workers are out of control
